

Since our last update, the Plant Protection Division (PPD) has continued its efforts to detect and manage YLH presence. Between May 29 and June 11, 2025, PPD discovered 24 hornets. PPD located one primary nest during this period, though no new nests were eradicated. The nest contained some larvae, but most of the adult hornets had already left, presumably relocating to a secondary site. Hornet detections remain steady, suggesting that embryo and primary nests are still intact in some areas and have not yet fully transitioned.



have occurred, while large red squares mark confirmed nest locations.



We ask that residents, particularly those in and around the Savannah area, which includes Chatham County, southern Effingham County, and adjacent Bryan County, stay observant and report any suspected Yellow-Legged Hornet activity.
